

Red Bull supreme at Sepang F1

Sebastian Vettel and teammate Mark Webber drove superbly to take one-two in Malaysia last weekend.

THE Red Bulls are in a class of their own, amid accusations that they are running some form of active suspension.

This would be a device which keeps the ride height of the car constant as the fuel load falls, thereby

maintaining underbody aerodynamic grip.

But Red Bull boss Christian Horner strongly denies these allegations and says he is against anyone using such a system.

I thought Sunday's race was a good one, with some great drives.

The most impressive was probably that of Lewis Hamilton, who, from 20th place, moved steadily up through the field to 6th place, where he became stuck behind Adrian Sutil, also in a Mercedes powered car.

Nico Rosberg drove well, finishing third and Mercedes boss Norbert Haug says Michael Schumacher's presence has spurred the young German on to achieve his potential.

Ferrari is concerned about engine reliability after Fernando Alonso and both Ferrari powered

Saubers were let down by their engines.

The new points system seems to be working well, with the top seven drivers all having scored more than 30 points.
